

WELCOME TO OUR ANNUAL REVIEW

Welcome to our Annual Review, a record of what you – our members – have achieved together in a year that has been far from straightforward.

We've navigated months of uncertainty around Creative Scotland's funding decisions. At times we were left waiting, unsure what could go ahead, only to then need to adapt at speed. Through all of this, your commitment to the network and live performance in rural communities never wavered.

We know that what you do can sometimes feel isolating or risky. Resources are stretched, audiences can be small, and expertise is often built through trial and error. And yet – there is always huge energy, and an enormous payoff in what it means for the social fabric of our communities. Whether you are unlocking the doors of a hall on a stormy night, devising new work with the Highlands in mind, or juggling the funding paperwork, it is your dedication that keeps rural touring alive. And through it all, what we believe in has acted as our anchor – reminding us why we exist and how we respond in the face of uncertainty.

Culture Transforms

Even in a year of uncertainty, the impact of live performance was evident. Our new Programming Pot supported 21 performers to reach 16 communities, engaging almost 1,700 audience members. In the Highlands, audiences rated 90% of shows as great or excellent, and nearly a third of those attending were new to their local venue. These results are a reminder that culture isn't a "nice to have" – it plays an active role in sustaining and renewing community life.

Connection is Vital

Our strength lies in the ties between people. More than 220 members came together at meetups and workshops this year, with 90% of you reporting you felt more connected as a result. The Focus Group, representing a broad mix of promoters and performers, fed directly into our Creative Scotland activity plan, ensuring member voices shaped our priorities. Alongside this, we provided over 530 hours of one-to-one advice – practical support that has helped members navigate fundraising, programming and audience development. At a time when isolation and uncertainty were very real, these connections mattered more than ever.

Rural is Radical

Working together in rural Scotland requires creativity, collaboration and commitment. Our micro-network model has shown what's possible when communities pool their effort. Six Highland venues collaborated to host 15 shows across three tours drawing in new audiences. In Argyll & Bute, a new micro-network has already begun building two carbon-conscious tours for 2025. These are radical acts: small venues working collectively to achieve scale, sustainability, and ambition that none could manage alone.

This has also been a year of change in our people. After ten years of dedicated service, we said goodbye to our Chair, Simon Hart, and welcomed Rhona Dougall into the role. Within the team, Teri Laing moved on to lead Forgan Arts Centre – leaving us the lasting gift of a new website ready to launch – while Julia Wylie begins maternity leave with our best wishes. A notable thank you to Fee Shaw for remaining supportive and steadfast throughout these changes.

Looking Ahead

The award of Creative Scotland multi-year funding has offered us – and many of you – a renewed sense of security after a long period of uncertainty. With that foundation, our work for the year ahead is clear. We will bring the network together at The Gathering in May, launch a new website to champion everything you do, and welcome new staff to strengthen our delivery. And we will continue to listen, adapt and advocate so that rural touring remains ambitious, sustainable, and valued.

Thank you to everyone who has played a part this year. Together, we've shown that our shared belief in the power of culture, connection and rural relevance is what sustains us.

MORE CONNECTED

NETWORK MEET UPS & TRAINING

BETTER ROUTED

MICRO-NETWORK DEVELOPMENT

We have continued to build micro-networks in the region, ensuring better routed, more sustainable tours, as well as peer support for programmers. With mutually agreed dates and clear routes between venues, tours are more viable financially and environmentally.

By joining forces, resources and expertise, arts venues and village halls can take risks and book and promote performances they might not normally programme. In addition, performers can spend more time in each area, allowing for deeper engagement with communities.

THE **TOURS**

Between March 2023-August 2024 the Highland micro-network jointly booked three tours. Theatre, music and dance genres were represented, and a total of 15 shows took place across Highland micro-network venues.

Fee Shaw, our Network Development Manager has followed a similar model of support to our first micro-network and worked with them one to one and as a collective to facilitate them around programming selections; audience engagement ideas; contracting; fair fees; ticketing; accommodation challenges and much more. One of the key differences from our first micro-network so far has been the complexities of connecting geographically dispersed groups with much wider ranges in programming preferences, capacity and resource. However, so far, the collaboration is working well as the micro-network move forward with building two well-routed, carbon conscious tours due to tour summer 2025.

Additionally, the micro-network model is already proving a useful mechanism to support Creative Scotland Touring Fund for Theatre and Dance funded work.

ACCESSIBLE **FUNDING**

PROGRAMMING POT

As well-established, devolved funders for Creative Scotland, we know that many promoters wouldn't be able to stage any live performances without access to a small pot of money. Following the success of our post-covid Transition Fund, we launched the new Programming Pot Fund alongside a Programming Policy to support promoter members to host live performances in their communities.

The Programming Pot fund aims to

- Support the touring of all genres of high-quality live performance
- Offer promoters a safety net to book shows or art forms that haven't performed in their communities before
- Stage more performances in more places
- Ensure performers are fairly paid
- Connect audiences to high quality live performances in the region
- Encourage members to work together – preference will be given to shows that are part of a tour

Top up the pot scheme

We launched an opt-in donations scheme "Top up the Pot", requesting that any promoters funded through The Programming Pot donate 20% of their profit made from box office income back into the pot to allow us to support more live performances in the region.

In 24/25, £800 has been raised, making one additional performance in our region possible!

Audience sizes ranged from 18 to 194 with an average of 53 in attendance.

These Funds have enabled 21 professional performers to reach 16 communities and an

estimated 1685 audience members in 24/25.

There is a clear demand for this fund, to allow for a sustained support for promoters to keep live performances happening in their communities. Following a shortfall in funding from Creative Scotland Multi Year fund, we will continue to fundraise to ensure this fund reaches more promoters across our region next year.

SEED **FUND**

This fund gives financial support to members who want to explore new ideas and projects that bring benefit to themselves and the wider network, and to better support collaborative working between performers and promoters.

Despite clear evidence of success of this fund to improve collaborative working, due to fund availability, it will be paused for 25/26. Any new applications will be required to be for activity from April 2026.

ACCESS **FUND**

Many of our members are volunteers, freelancers, carers, have other jobs and/or live in remote locations. All of this limits their ability to access opportunities.

We offer small grants to help with travel costs, caring responsibilities, loss of income or disability requirements – this is a vital fund that under-pins our services and ensures there are no barriers to access.

The types of members who access this fund, and where they are located are detailed below.





WIDER REACH

MEMBER SNAPSHOT

We have continued to seek a clearer understanding of geographic gaps in promoter membership and to support arts activity in areas with a lack of arts provision. Our growth strategy and values are underpinned by ensuring the network remains is sustainable, organically grown and accessible.

Although our performer membership has again grown significantly this year, our promoter membership has reduced a little, along with their capacity to programme

Promoter members fell from 52 to 51 promoters, with the percentage of these promoters programming in the last 12 months also dropping by 10% from last year, from 93.1% in 2023 to 82% in 2024.

We have seen a net increase in members across all regions, apart from Highland, where there has been a decrease. Less representation was noted again in the Isles.

Reasons for cancellation and reductions in programming activity were mixed, with members citing lack of programming capacity, no arts activity, changes in staff or financial reasons.

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CULTURAL LINKS

PARTNERSHIP WORKING, EVENTS AND REPRESENTATION

The Touring Network continues to work with the North East Arts Touring Network (NEAT), Dumfries and Galloway Arts and Live Borders to form a shared vision for Rural Touring in Scotland.

In the summer, we co-hosted a "Rural Touring Backstage" online event with Dumfries and Galloway Arts Festival, sowing the seeds to more collaborative delivery. We remain connected with a number of cultural sector peers and regional development members including Eden Court, Federation of Scottish Theatre (FST), Scottish Opera, Scottish Music Industry Association (SMIA), Culture, Heritage and Arts (CHARTS), SCAN. The Directe fed into a number of sector consultations and events including the SCVO village halls conference, advocating for culture in civic spaces.

Claire continues to represent The Touring Network by sitting on Culture for Climate's Green Arts Initiative Steering Group. Additionally, members of the team sit on boards of their local venues, taking an interest and contributing to the bigger picture.

RESOURCES

Rural touring resources

We ended 24/25, ready to launch our new our online library of advice for all those involved in touring and hosting live performance in rural Scotland. This will see us share intelligence, templates and advice to help members to understand the nuts, bolts and nuances of putting on shows in our region.

We have worked to ensure that the collective efforts of our members are seen and celebrated. We support members ongoing with their marketing efforts – all of which will lead to a sense of vibrancy around the network and growth in their audiences.

94% of members who accessed our marketing and audience development resources and opportunities reported they helped them to make their work more visible to audiences

We continue to issue monthly email Noticeboards, highlighting network activity and members' news.

Our partnership with Data Thistle continued, enabling our members to share event listings more widely. Our micro-network project was widely covered by local and regional press. We have been working hard behind the scenes on a new website which will host a members' directory, as well as stories and member spotlights.

DIVERSIFYING **AUDIENCES**

The Touring Network wants to ensure that more people, from all parts of society, can engage with live performance. We have supported our members to make their audiences more diverse through our micro-network and programming policy.

Theatre in Schools Scotland (TISS) brings bold, inspiring live theatre and dance performances into schools throughout Scotland, run by the National Theatre of Scotland and Imaginate.

The Touring Network and Theatre in Schools Scotland have worked together over the last few years to support better access to theatre for school aged children in the region, widening their reach and removing financial risk for schools.

In 24/25, with our help, it has meant that TISS could support two performers to tour to eight schools reaching a total of 1069 younger audience members!
